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Dear DSA Community,

I would like to inform you about an incident that occurred on school property this morning. A student reported that a weapon was in the building. This is certainly a terrifying experience for our students and for all of our school community. We are extremely proud of our student for immediately reporting this situation to school personnel. Denver School of the Arts Administration immediately called DPS Safety and Security. Officers from DPS Safety and Security and Denver Police quickly responded and the school was placed in lock down. After conducting a search of the building no weapons were found. Our staff was diligent in following district safety protocols and did an outstanding job in ensuring that students were safe.

I want to again remind all students and parents about safety awareness. Safety is a top priority in Denver Public Schools and at Denver School of the Arts. Please be assured that our staff will continue our vigilance throughout each day to ensure the safety of your child. Posted on the DSA web site is a list of Emergency Procedures that I highly recommend you review as parents, and review with your students. I encourage you to take this chance to talk with your child about contacting an adult immediately if they ever feel unsafe, confirming after-school arrangements together and ensuring your child understands the importance of dialing 911 if he or she ever feels unsafe.

Here are additional safety tips:

- Teach your children to use the buddy system.
- Know where they are at all times. Establish good communication with children to ensure they readily will report to you any unusual occurrences.
- If they are approached by strangers, they should take several steps backward, stay out of arm's reach and run to a safe area. If they are confronted, they should be taught to scream. Many times children forget to scream.
- Make sure children learn to identify safe people such as policemen and firemen. Show them where safe homes or buildings are in the neighborhood in case they need to run to them. Identify which neighbors are available to help when you are not at home. In an emergency situation, children should run to the nearest house for assistance. They should avoid alleys and empty lots, houses or garages.
- Parents should notify both the school and the police if an incident occurs anywhere or anytime.
