Denver School of the Arts Remote Learning Purpose Statement

Our mission during these extraordinary times is geared toward generating a good faith effort to provide the best possible educational opportunities and support for all of our students while they embark upon remote learning. We hope to achieve engaging and meaningful academic and arts experiences by:

- Providing a sound schedule of consistency and support for students as we continue the learning process.
- Provide students and families with social and emotional resources to help us all through these difficult situations.
- Intentionally planning lessons that allow students to continue their learning that works with them both in our remote school setting and in their home life.

DSA Remote Learning - Getting Started

- Remote learning for students begins on Tuesday, April 7.
- Beginning on April 6, each teacher will have a document linked on the front page of DSA's website that includes
 their remote class specifics (links for access, assignments, live & recorded class schedules, office hours, for
 example). Students and families are encouraged to use this "main page" to locate each teacher's link. This page
 will be added to the DSA home page
- Prior to April 7, all teachers are expected to reach out to families to connect with their students and communicate where students will access the online content for that class (which is also included on the DSA Remote Learning page). Teachers have been asked to include specifics about office hours and ways to contact them, as well.

- Any live classes that students are asked to attend will be following a shortened version of DSA's building schedule. Click on these links to see the schedules: <u>Grades 6 & 7</u> and <u>Grades 8-12</u>
- Our goal is for learning to be authentic and allow each teacher the option to choose lessons that support the learners in their classrooms and that (ideally) continue where instruction left off on March 13.
- The first week (April 7-April 10), begins on Tuesday. For this week only, our grades 8-12 schedule will begin on a Black day and will proceed as follows:

Tuesday, April 7 - Black Day Schedule

Wednesday, April, 8 - White Day Schedule

Thursday, April 9 - Black Day Schedule

Friday, April 10 - White Day Schedule

*Beginning the week of April 13, we will resume the regular schedule (Black, White, Black, White) with teacher office hours on Friday.

DSA Remote Learning - What to Expect

- During our first week, we will be focusing on engagement, connections, and supporting students where they are. We want to spend the first week ensuring that all of our students are logging in, have any technical issues corrected, and that they have a chance to learn about what to expect from their new, virtual classrooms.
- Teachers will offer office hours at least once a week per our daily schedule. Teachers will connect with students via Schoology Conference, Google Hangouts, or Google Meet to have face time with students.
- Students will have about 30 minutes a day of work per class for a total of about 4 hours of work a day. Please note this is just an average and sometimes it may be more and sometimes it may be less.
- Student work may be self-paced, or a hybrid of online and self-paced activities with weekly assignments in each class to work and learn through. At any time a question may arise, we encourage students to reach out directly to their teachers for assistance.

We understand that learning will not be entirely online and may include reading, exercising, drawing, playing, construction, writing, or other virtual school day tasks that can be documented through photos, videos, reports, chats, quizzes, etc. and turned in or shared remotely.

We do not assume that remote learning will look like our day-to-day brick and mortar instruction. For that
reason, we have given our teachers the flexibility to craft their classroom to fit the needs of their students while
ensuring educational expectations of remote learning are met. We are still awaiting guidance from the Colorado
Department of Education and Denver Public Schools central office related to grades, but students need to be as
engaged and completing assigned work as much as possible.

Student Expectations

- All students need a working computer, charger, and internet access. If you do not have one, or having difficulty, please reach out to Michael Kimble@dpsk12.org for tech support.
- Beginning on April 7 and until further indicated, students will be expected to fully participate in remote learning.
- Students should check their school email or teacher pages at least once a day beginning Monday, April 6.

How Parents Can Support

- Please work to provide your child with quiet space and dedicated time to do their work.
- If your child has any questions, have them reach out to their teachers or members of the staff.
- Feel free to check out the DSA Remote Learning document on DSA's webpage to see expectations for each of your child's classes.
